



### The Only but GOLDEN Age of PANIC by DAVE HERRINGSTELLA MOVED BUT I MOVED

As you may recall, last issue we presented an article entitled, "The GOLDEN AGE of PANIC (Actually the only age of PANIC)" in it we gave a general review of the 12 issues that comprised the life of PANIC. Now we are beginning a new feature that we will present in each succeding issue of ODD. Each article will review a separate issue of PANIC as we do with MAD. We might as well go in chronological order so this article is devoted to PANIC#1.

Unlike the GOLDEN Age of Mad series, we will refrain from printing reproductions of the covers. Although the covers were very good, they do not merit the amount of effort it takes to duplicate them as do the MAD masterpieces. But mainly we're too lazy to trace 2 covers every issue.

The cover of PANIC #1 was done by Al Feldstein who isn't much of an artist anyway. It showed Santa Claus coming down the chimney and stepping into a huge bear trap left there by a nice little boy. It is obvious that the cover layout is an attempt to imitate MAD's covers(or vice versa) like MAD's "TALES CALCULATED TO DRIVE YOU MAD" PANIC had "THIS IS NO MAGAZINE: THIS IS A...PANIC" and similar to MAD's slogan on the left margin"HUMOR IN A JUGULAR VEIN" PANIC had "HUMOR IN A VARICOSE VEIN" to the left.

The first story we are greeted by is entitled 'My Gun Is The Jury!" and is drawn by Jack Davis(who, you may recall had the privilege of drawing the first story in MAD#1 also) The story is a satire of Mickey Spillane's Mike Hammer. It ridiculed Mike's tendency to constantly kill young and beautiful women. A good illustration of this is depicted in the upper right of this page. Now, this kind of attitude is not natural.

The story offered a reason why Mike enjoyed killing women. And a very logical reason it was. Upon killing his latest beauty Mike was shocked to see that his victum was only disguised as a woman and was actually a man. Mike broke into tears and pleaded with "Stella" begging him not to die, for you see Mike did not like to kill men for the simple reason that Mike Hammershlammer was really a woman!

PANIC now turned to a satire of a then popular T.V. show. I'm sure you all remember it, it was called, "This Is Your Life". PANIC



called it, "THIS IS YOUR STRIFE". Joe Orlando (Creepy artist) did the honors. In my opinion the story was the worst in the issue, if not the worst ever to appear in PANIC. The person who's life was being retold was a fictional star named Melvin Melville. Throughout the entire show they kept on bringing out old aquaintances of him who each had a little evidence that he had murdered his wife before leaving his home town. The ending was obvious, the District Attorney from his home town was introduced and Melvin was arrested for murder.

Next we come to the first and only story in PANIC to be illustrated by Jack Kamen. it was called, "Little Red Riding Hood". It seems she grew up to be quite a dish(pic to left). But it also seems that when she was a child and the woodsman shot the wolf in her Grandma's house that it really was her grandma he shot. She told this to her boyfriend Melvin and explained that all the members of her family became wolves when they matured, werewolves that is. By the time she had finished a full moon rose in the sky and poor Melvin found out she was telling the truth. Too bad he never lived to tell about it.

Our last story is the product of Bill Elder himself. It is merely "The Night Before Christmas" but with wild illustrations. For instance for the phrase


"While visions of sugarplums danced in their heads..." the panel showed 3 boys and a dog asleep on beds of nails. The dog drempt of a big beautiful tree, while the other 3 drempt of Marilyn Monroe, Jane Russel, and finally the best dream of them all, a free lifetime subscription to E.C. comics. The whole poem was riotously illustrated with similar jokes and puns. As hard to believe as it seems, it was because of this story that PANIC#1 was banned in Boston.



















## PORNOGRAPHY in fandom By Stephen W. HERRING


In ODD \$10 we published a small off-set strip on the back cover which represented Spiderman as using his talents of building climbing and web swinging to spy on a young, semi-nude woman through a window many stories high. We put this contribution in because we thought the art was fairly good and the joke was, if nothing else, a satirical reverse on the clean cut all american figure of Peter Parker. The reaction, however, was unanimously negative, questioning our taste and right to publish such a strip. This unexpected attitude represents a special phenomenon in the world of fandom which deserves some discussion.

The first question that comes to mind is, "Are fandom publishers, editors, artists, writers and readers really opposed to pornography, or is it just pornography in fandom?" I know of a few members of the fan world who oppose pornography in fandom simply because of parental pressure (They don't want to hide their zines along with the Playboys). This "pressure" is probably universal since it has been estimated that the average fan age is 15-18, but in spite of the critical parental supervision I don't honestly believe that this is the reason for the suppression of off shade art and writing in the ditto world. A healthy interest in sex is natural, but it has its place and this place is not in the area of comic hobbies, here art and writing.

The next question one may ask is, "Does this reflect a high degree of morality among these people?" I know a few basically immoral people in fandom, my brother and myself for example, but this has nothing to do with the standards and super-structure of comic art and writing which provides no demand for anything outside of what is found underneath the seal of the Comics Code Authority. The only possible breach in the code with amateur comics is in the use of violence, but violence is more indicative of the super hero than sex!

I do not think that our faithful postmasters need worry about pornography in our mail when they see our tattered, third class envelopes with scribbled addresses and humble heckto return addresses going all over the country. Perhaps the only reason that we haven't used pornography is that we would have to send mail first class which is the last thing our traditionally stingy fan editors would do.

MAD #7 began just like most of the comics published today...with a cover. Under the magnificent direction of Harvey Kurtzman, the cover depicted a rather gruesome looking creature being followed by those two minutes, Dr. Whatsit & Shermlock Shomes . A reasonable facsimile of it

is pictured on the provious page.

The first offering in this issue is drawn by Bill Elder, everybody's favorite, and is called SHERMLOCK SHOMES. 
strating to a boy that he could flip eggs.


